



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Creating a Neighborhood Benefits District (NBD) in the Grandmont Rosedale Communities

GRDC is spearheading a campaign to establish a Neighborhood Benefits District (NBD) in the Grandmont Rosedale area. A NBD is a type of Special Assessment District (SAD); the committee changed the name from SAD to NBD to emphasize the positive changes the project will bring to the neighborhood and city. It is an innovative crime prevention strategy that will provide a substantial and sustainable source of funds needed on an annual basis to effectively reduce crime, provide snow removal and improve public safety in our community. A task force of neighborhood residents and a GRDC staff person are leading the effort.

The NBD is authorized under Michigan Public Act 287 of 2011 (as amended). Before an NBD can be established, the City of Detroit must pass an ordinance describing the procedures under which a NBD will be created and operated. The ordinance shall authorize the use of petitions to initiate the establishment of a special assessment district. The record owners of not less than 51% of the land comprising the actual special assessment district must sign the petition to approve a special assessment in the area.

Once the NBD is established, every property owner within the district will be assessed a special fee of approximately \$50-\$100 per year, in addition to their regular property tax. The funds collected will be used to provide services by private contractors to that specific district. The services will

supplement, not replace, normal city services.

Unlike the voluntary dues collected currently, once 51% of the residences sign the petition for the NBD, participation from all homes in the area will be mandatory. Each neighborhood will identify which services it needs. The neighborhood residents will customize their programs to meet their individual security and/or snow removal needs.

The GRDC neighborhoods have also encouraged other neighborhoods throughout the city to join forces in support of the NBD and have started a City-Wide Coalition. The City-Wide Coalition is seeking Council's support and seeks to provide input on the Council's proposed ordinance.

NBD Timeline:

- April 2011: GRDC formed the NBD Taskforce
- Nov. 2011: City-Wide Coalition was formed in support of the NBD
- Dec. 2011: Michigan Public Act 287 of 2011 MCL 117.5i was updated to reduce the population threshold to 600,000 to enact the NBD in the City of Detroit
- April 2012: NBD was presented to the Standing Committee of Council
- May 2012: NBD was presented to Council as a whole and was supported by all Council members
- Currently pending: NBD Ordinance by the City of Detroit

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Citizens Radio Patrol: A Brief Guide

Through a partnership with the Detroit Police Department (DPD), radio patrol groups across the city have been supported for their crime prevention efforts since 1967. During that year, the Citizens Radio Patrol Assistance Program of Detroit was established to grant residents a unique opportunity to deter crime: observe our communities, report suspicious behavior to the authorities, and get mileage reimbursed for our efforts (other approved operating expenses MAY be approved for reimbursement as well).

A city as large as Detroit is dependent upon collaboration between the DPD and committed residents. It may seem too simplified, but criminals are not in the business of working harder; they are looking to avoid being observed, avoid contact, and avoid getting caught. Read on below if you are still interested in taking part in a growing strength of the city of Detroit...Citizens Radio Patrol.

What is it?

It is a community-driven process that gives residents the option of taking ownership over their neighborhood's safety. Committed citizens act as patrollers, observers, or base operators—all crucial to the overall operation of the program (more on that later).

Who is it?

Driven community members who dedicate their time, effort, and, on occasion, own money to establish a new standard of safety in their neighborhood. More or less, it is made up of residents who share a similar interest in crime prevention working with local law enforcement officials—collaboration at its finest.


What's the point?

Crime deterrence. Increasing the presence of citizen patrollers in a neighborhood shows would-be criminals that the community is not going to sit by as crime runs rampant. The efforts are initiated to reduce crime but can lead to something much more: an increased quality of life.

How does it work?

Each “team” consists of three people: a driver, observer, and base operator. The driver and observer patrol the neighborhood in a designated vehicle with bright orange vests and observe a specific area. They communicate with a base operator (standing by at home) with radios or cell phones. Anytime a suspicious behavior or criminal act is

observed, the observer contacts the base operator who contacts the proper authorities. If it is an emergency, the observer directly calls 911.



What are the benefits?

Joining a Citizens Radio Patrol could not only increase your neighborhood's safety but also foster a sense of community. Volunteers work together with a shared purpose/goal and find themselves further invested in crime prevention efforts.

The collaboration between the DPD and residents opens up lines of communication that may have not existed before. Residents provide useful information, as they act as the “eyes and ears” of a police force that cannot be everywhere all the time. It's a mutually beneficial partnership...it could use your help!

Is it dangerous?

No. Citizens Radio Patrol is for observation only, not a group of vigilantes running the streets. During the course of identifying criminals and observing suspicious behaviors patrollers may be confronted with dangerous situations, but they are instructed to NOT get involved and call the police.

The Citizens Radio Patrol has put together a number of rules that the program is bound by:

- Members must be at least 18 years old.
- Two members must always be in a patrol car.
- No weapons of any kind can be carried...Period!
- Crime and serious situations must be reported immediately to the base operator for relay to the police.
- Patrollers are not to engage in high-speed chases.
- Patrollers must remain in their vehicles, except to perform “Good Samaritan” acts.¹

Garden Club News

Gardening time is in full swing! Your Garden Committee is out in full force to view all of the hard work and subsequent beauty rendered by our dedicated residents. We have begun viewing the islands earlier this year, so be ready! Those blocks with Winner's Circle islands, be ready; we are judging yours, as well! Winner's Circle islands are asked to maintain the high quality standard that allowed them to win in the first place. The garden committee was impressed by an increased level of participation during the last planting season. We look forward to an even higher rate of participation this year. Many blocks have started early with the spring planting and are busy doing maintenance for our full summer blooms. We have compiled a list timely gardening tips for our green-thumbed residents:

TIPS

- Be sure to prune your roses often.
- An alternative rose food is 1 cup of Epsom salt mixed in 1 gallon of water.
- Coreopsis flowers received last year also need to be pruned after the flowers die off for re-blooming.

- Make sure mulch is two inches away from the base of the plant.
- Draw your fingernails across a bar of soap before working in your garden to prevent dirt from accumulating under your nails.
- Use the water left over from steam-cooking your vegetables to pour over your patio plants. Your plants will love this nutritious "vegetable soup."
- Old coffee and tea grounds can be used to acidify the soil of acid-loving plants such as azaleas, rhododendrons, camellias, gardenias & even blueberries.
- Spray vegetable oil on the line of your string trimmer before installing it into the trimmer in order to prevent jamming or breaking.
- Herbs can be dried quickly by arranging them in a single layer on top of newspapers placed inside your car with all doors and windows closed.

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

LOW-COST ENERGY AUDITS

COMMUNITY POLICING

PILOT PROGRAM – At the May Neighborhood Safety Meeting, the Manhattan Institute, in cooperation with the Detroit Police Department (DPD), Michigan Department of Corrections (MDOC), and the GRDC Community Security Program,

unveiled a new 90-day Community Policing Pilot Program for the Grandmont Rosedale neighborhoods.

This pilot includes increased police activity on the streets beginning June 4, 2012 (i.e., “broken-window” policing); pro-active home visits to the men and women who have caused the most harm by invading OUR homes (i.e., committing B & E’s); and increased citizen participation, the backbone of this program and every form of community policing. Residents must accept the responsibility of “see something, say something,” and incorporate it into their everyday lives. It takes a LOT of people to keep track of and take care of all of the vacant houses in our neighborhood. 

Residents are eligible to save hundreds of dollars on their energy bills, and get cash back on energy-saving investments in their homes. This could include 0% APR financing or up to \$3,000 in incentives toward any energy-saving projects you choose!

Summaries of RPIA Board Meetings of April 23 and May 21, 2012

Highlights of the April planning meeting included reports from the finance committee, outreach committee, events committee, code enforcement committee, and vacant housing committee. There was also an update regarding the initiative from the neighborhood benefits district, and a report from the RPIA president.

Highlights of the May planning meeting included updates from GRDC representative, reports from the outreach

committee, finance committee, code enforcement committee, neighborhood benefits district. The board also held discussions related to political campaigning at future general membership meetings and formed a nominating committee for potential board member recruitment in the coming year.

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RPIA General Membership Meeting Minutes • May 8, 2012

The meeting was called to order at 7:16pm by RPIA Board First Vice President Pam Weinstein.

Welcome and Introductions

Pam welcomed all in attendance and acknowledged the block captains, officers, board members and residents that were new to Rosedale Park.

DTE Energy Reliability Improvement Plan

DTE Representative used a PowerPoint presentation to give residents an overview of how the electrical system in our neighborhood is designed and runs in the Rosedale Park area. There are six circuits that are responsible for the power distributed throughout our area. The main factors that contribute to power outages are trees and wind. DTE will come out and trim trees and vines that cause potential liabilities to circuits and lines around homes. The Reliability Improvement Plan consists of steps that DTE will take to decrease power outages in a more proactive way. They plan to patrol and inspect circuit poles and equipment for potential hazards, implement a fusing study that will alert DTE of potential circuit outages before they occur, and replace copper wiring with aluminum wiring that will not snap when trees fall on it, to name a few of the parts to the plan. DTE is already working in the Grandmont area with a completion date sometime in June. At that time, DTE will begin implementing these changes in the Rosedale Park area. The floor was opened for questions while DTE representatives stayed after the meeting to discuss any billing issues residents may have had.

Detroit Works Project: Long-Range and Short-Range Plans

Representatives from the Detroit Works Long-Term Strategy team was in attendance to discuss the strategies they have devised to improve the quality of life for Detroit. He provided residents with a handout that identified key imperatives that they are using to set a direction to improve the city. There are three additional phases that will follow this, including Phase 2: Directions, Phase 3: Strategies, and Phase 4: Create the Roadmap. Residents were provided a handout that detailed this initiative. For more information, residents were encouraged to contact Detroit Works directly at 313-259-4407.

Home Improvement Project through “Rippling Hope.org”

State Representative David Nathan reminded residents of the Rippling Hope home repair program that is being made available to residents in the Rosedale Park area. Rep. Nathan said they had received over 500 applications, which are currently being reviewed. Neighbors will be notified at the end of this month if they have been selected to receive the free home repairs. Volunteers will soon begin working on the homes of those selected. The whole program is devised to assist in strengthening area block associations.

A Message from the Code Enforcement Committee

As we embark on the summer, the Code Enforcement Committee (CEC) asks you to keep in mind a few simple things that you can do to keep our neighborhood looking its best. We ask that you do the following:

- Keep your lawn maintained and cut (at a minimum, every 2 weeks)
- If your property's backyard borders the Southfield service drive, cut that area as well (at a minimum, every 2 weeks)
- Report any improperly parked vehicles to the CEC
- If you see basketball hoops or residents playing basketball in the street, report this activity to the CEC

The Code Enforcement Committee has also provided the City with a list of residents who are currently violating parking enforcement codes for what we hope will be a focused effort in the neighborhood to ticket and/or tow these illegally parked vehicles. This effort will focus not only on cars that are illegally parked on the street, but will also take into account vehicles that are in the back yard (or anywhere else on the property) that are inoperable, unlicensed, and unregistered.
